# MESSAGE FROM OUR GENERAL MANAGER

**HELLO MAY!** 

Spring is here and lots going at the club! A little April recap of events! Gerhold Concrete meetings, Uncork a Cure (Sammy's), Columbus Classic, OFC (Our Finest Citizen's), Cactus, Bridge's, Holiday Dance, Men's Leagues, Pillen's Golf outing, FAC and Kid's Night, and the Easter Buffet!

This years Easter's Brunch was much different than previous years! Our goal this year was to accommodate more people. We hosted approx. 130 last year and wanted to increase that number to 200. We researched ways to effectively increase numbers and found we would need to accept two waves of reservations, one at 10 am and one at noon! The benefits of this approach are to allow enough time for families to eat and conversate and staff time to flip tables (groups of 8 or more take double the normal time). We also tried to squeeze the Easter Egg Hunt in the middle at 11 am which posed a few unforeseen small dilemmas but nothing too critical. We have already discussed how to improve the Egg Hunt for next year. We exceeded our goal by 30 this year serving 230 adults and children! We were a bit understaffed during the second wave but know exactly how to pivot for next year! Another cool fact, our reservation list was full almost an entire week before Easter! On that note, make sure and get your Mother's Day count in with the office soon. We already have some reservations and expect to fill up again!

A common question buzzing around the club these days is, are we going to continue with the GL/Pub update? When? What's it going to look like? What's going to happen to the old golf lounge in the basement? Who paid for the new T.V.'s and additions to the new golf lounge?

I would like to offer a sincere response to all the floating questions. The Elk's Country Club is moving forward with updating the pub/golf lounge/pro-shop/outdoor deck space! ### MESSAGE FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

#### **Hello Members**

In the past few newsletters, I have talked about how a successful golf maintenance staff can perform to the best of its ability - like a three-legged stool. The three "legs" to produce a golf course members deserve are: 1) staff, 2) equipment, and 3) a good irrigation system - the lifeblood of the course.

The April issue talked about equipment. The March issue introduced you to Justin Miller, my assistant. So this month, let's talk irrigation.

Installed sometime in the 1960's, the original Elks' system is a frost-free, single-row, quick couple system six feet underground. The quick couplers were placed every 30 yards, with four located around each green.

This system required a man to work overnight, turning on and moving large, quick coupler sprinklers up and down each tee and fairway. It would take 8 to 10 hours a night to complete the watering. This is how it was done back then, and it was a good system at the time.

Steel risers connected to an asbestos pipe main line were also installed six feet below the frost line.




Because these risers have been in the ground for over 50 years, holes have developed in places (picture below) and we need to bring in a large excavator to repair them.

A PVC system with glue bell fittings was installed in the 90s with a life expectancy of 20 years. The glue fittings (not designed to last this long in the ground) have become weak and have started to fail. (picture below) These are three feet underground, and we must dig by hand to fix them



Unfortunately - to save money when the newer irrigation system was installed - the decision was made to not run a new main and just tie into the old system to deliver water to the course. Which means, even though we have a 30-year-old system tied to a 50-year-old system, we actually have a 50-year-old system.

The system does not have isolation valves, and if we get a leak on the old system, we must turn the well off and drain the system to fix the leak without causing any other leaks along the PVC system. This takes time.



We had 43 leaks in our PVC system last year, each of which takes anywhere from 1 to 4 hours to fix. Our average cost for parts was \$60, not including labor. The original system had 11 leaks last year, each of which took anywhere from 2 to 6 hours to repair, and an average cost per fix of \$250, including excavator rental but not including labor.

In short, irrigation system maintenance is a large cost in our budget.

I share this information not to scare you, but to give you a better idea of the costs and labor that go toward maintaining a quality course, and to help you understand why we will need to replace the old system with a new one.

## Did you know...?

In an effort to provide transparent communications and improve member satisfaction, the Elks' newsletter has been publishing information about the costs to operate the Elks - from painting the pool, to pressing tablecloths and purchasing fertilizer. This month, we address some rumors and realities about moving the golf lounge upstairs.

#### THE RUMORS

- Formal dining is going away. Not true. The Elks can provide both casual and fine dining on the same floor. "Some of our members with kids have said it feels like they 'bother' the older members who are all dressed up for dinner, so then, they don't come out to eat at all," said Trista. "We want to be a club for all our members, and the West Elks room gives families a place to eat while reserving the east side for those who want a more fine dining experience."
- There won't be food for kids at the pool this summer. Again, not true. We will have more summer staff to support serving members who come out to enjoy the pool.
- Not many members answered the survey. Actually, 237 members did. We had a 65% rate of return, which is much higher than the 10% average return on surveys.
- Some members can't take the stairs. They don't need to because the paved roadway between the pro shop and the front door leads to a zero-entry ramp up to the front door.
- Private tournaments don't do anything for the club.

  Untrue. Private tournaments return a profit necessary to club operations, reducing the total amount members would have to pay. The 2024 Nebraska Open brought in more than \$15,000 in one weekend.
- I just don't like it. We don't need it. Some people
  didn't like Elvis' music; initially, didn't like cars at first.
  Still others were afraid of electricity, yet each
  advancement made life a little better for a lot of
  people.

#### THE REALITIES

- There's more camaraderie and socializing. "Since moving the golf lounge upstairs, we've noticed players are staying longer after their rounds to enjoy other members and a beverage at the bar." One waiter even noticed some non-OFC members talking with OFC members during their monthly gathering in the banquet room. Prior to moving the lounge upstairs, there was little interaction between OFC members and anyone else in the club. "Members tell us they enjoy looking out the windows to see the course, when before they could only see the pool."
- The staff is more unified. Employees assigned to upstairs dining on Thursday night often found themselves working alone when the lounge was open, especially after league. "It was necessary to have a waiter available for any reservations or if anyone came in impromptu. But Thursday night reservations are often minimal, which meant one wait staff worked an entire room downstairs alone, while the other sat idle upstairs waiting for the phone to ring or door to open. Now, the staff can support one another, serve customers better, and we are more efficient, overall. As one staff member said, 'It doesn't feel like a ghost town upstairs anymore.'"
- Change is good. What would happen to Columbus if Hwy 30 was never replaced? The original infrastructure would crumble and fail, drivers would avoid the route, and the city would look ugly. The same is true for the club. If we do not update the facility and grounds, and if we do nothing to bring in new members, the costs will become too high, members would drop, and the club would eventually close.



## 2025 Summer Kick-off adds a few twists

This Memorial Day weekend will serve as the launch of summer 2025, as well as the Elks' Summer Kickoff. Yet, this year's events promise a few twists to what has "always been done."

The annual charge of \$100 remains the same, as does the option to withdraw your support of the club's annual fundraiser.

Last year's Kickoff raised \$21,000 (representing twothirds of our members' participation) and was used for necessary equipment, building repairs, and other course improvements. Imagine, if all 363 members participated, how much more we could accomplish!

This year, the dollars raised will continue management's goals to revitalize the ECC property and main clubhouse, enhance both casual and fine dining menus, promote the golf course's quality, and increase Elk members.

To make this year's event more beneficial to members, a few twists are planned:
